



#### Scripture Reflection

The beginning of this gospel reading shows Mary of Magdala coming to the tomb early in the morning while it is still dark. The narrative quickly shifts to what is unusual about the

scene-Mary noticing that the stone had been removed form the tomb. Without a doubt, that is a tremendous and paradigm-shifting occurrence. When Simon Peter and the other disciple arrive at the tomb and realize that Jesus is no longer dead and no longer house din the dark tomb, one layer of this incredible event is unveiled. Christ's physical resurrection demonstrates the mighty power of God. We bear witness to God's abiding love to humankind, a love that declares, "I love you so much that I will journey with you unto death and bring you out on the other side." + In a smaller, guieter way it is also guite moving to imagine Mary and the other women visiting the tomb and tending to Jesus' body in the days between the crucifixion and the resurrection. These women may have overcome fear of judgment or even violence from the community to go and care for Jesus' body. They may have had to overcome shame or embarrassment after watching their spiritual leader endure such an undignified execution. Then, of course, there is the soul-rocking grief of mourning a beloved friend. + The Easter story is overflowing with miracles, and perhaps one such miracle is that Mary and the disciples exhibit a love and devotion that was not extinguished by fear or by a gruesome and humiliating death. What love, what tenacity of spirit compels one to return and willingly encounter profound trauma again and again? Even without fully understanding what Jesus meant when he said that he would rise again, Mary of Magdala and the disciples returned to the tomb believing that their love held significance regardless of whether it could change circumstances. + This may evoke modern images of first responders working tirelessly at a scene of a disaster. Or medical professionals who provide palliative care to terminally ill patients. Or counselors and psychiatrists who provide treatment for people living with debilitating mental illness for which there may never be a cure. It is a beautiful aspect of our human nature that we are so often driven to return, to strive, to persist, and to care even against all odds. The kernel of hope that reveals itself during our worst moments is perhaps a glimpse of the divine likeness breathed into each of us by God at the moment of our creation. + Although this Easter narrative shows us a mournful vigil that culminates in an astonishing and miraculous revelation, let us consider how the spirit of resurrection is also present in the perpetual vigil-in the ways we keep showing us day after day to break chains, nurture relationships, and show mercy and compassion. Although we live in hope, it is true that we may not see the fruit of our labors. Or, as this Easter story also demonstrates, the miracle we receive may be grander than our imaginings. Let us nurture the hope that lives within our hearts while also placing our trust and our joy in the resurrection God has in store for us-whatever its form.

# Questions to Ponder

We know so well how this story ends, but try to put yourself in the place of Mary Magdalene or one of the disciples as they put the pieces together for the first time. What would you be thinking and feeling as this absolutely unthinkable event unfolds? + Like the characters of this gospel, we also often encounter the risen Christ in oblique signs and symbols, things that are easy to overlook in our busy day. What in your life might be an overlooked symbol of resurrection?

"This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad." Psalm 118
