

POPE FRANCIS' MESSAGE TO YOUTH-PART 1 0F 7 FOR WORLD YOUTH DAY-2023-LISBON, PORTUGAL

Dear Young People, the theme of the Panama World Youth Day was, "I am the servant of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." After that event, we resumed our journey towards a new destination-Lisbon 2023-with hearts afire with God's urgent summons to arise. In 2020, we meditated on Jesus' words, "Young man, I say to you, arise! (Luke 7:14). Last year, too, we were inspired by the figure of the Apostle Paul, to whom the Risen Lord said: "Arise! I appoint you as witness of what you have seen" (Acts 26:16). Along the route we still need to travel before arriving in Lisbon, we will have at our side the Virgin of Nazareth who, immediately after the Annunciation, "arose and went with haste" (Luke 1:39). Common to these themes is the word: "arise!" It is a word that also-let us remember-speaks to us of getting up from our slumber, waking up to the life all around us. + In these troubling times, when our human family, already tested by the trauma of the pandemic, is racked by the tragedy of war. Mary shows all of us, and especially you, young people like herself, the path of proximity and encounter. I hope and I firmly believe that the experience many of you will have in Lisbon next August will represent a new beginning for you, the young, and—with you—for humanity as a whole. + After the Annunciation, Mary could have focused on herself and her own worries and fears about her new condition. Instead, she entrusted herself completely to God. Her thoughts turned to Elizabeth. She got up and went forth, into the world of life and movement. Even though the astonishing message of an angel had caused a seismic shift in her plans, the young Mary did not remained paralyzed, for within her was Jesus, the power of the resurrection and new life. With herself, Mary already bore the Lamb that was slain and yet lives. She arises and sets out, for she is certain that God's plan is the best plan for her life. Mary becomes a temple of God, an image of the pilgrim Church, a Church that goes forth for service, a Church that brings the good news to all! + To experience the presence of the risen Christ in our own lives, to encounter him "alive," is the greatest spiritual joy, an explosion of light that can leave no one untouched. Mary sets out immediately, anxious to bring the good news to others, to bear witness to the joy of this encounter. This too is what caused the haste of the first disciples following the resurrection: "[the women] left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples" (Matthew 28:8). to be continued...



Scripture Reflection

During the exodus from Egypt, God supported Israel's life in two ways. First, God provided miraculous bread. God also instructed the Israelites, guiding them through the desert and giving laws that provided peace and prosperity. As this Sunday's first reading teaches, miraculous food

and divine instruction worked together to keep the Israelites alive as they journeyed through the desert. + This Sunday's responsorial psalm offers a similar reflection. Even in the promised land, God provides peace and security with the "best of wheat" and inspired instruction. The psalmist emphasizes though that Israel benefits from God's gifts only when Israel first follows God's Word. + In the second reading, St. Paul adapts these ancient teachings for Christ's early followers. Apparently, the Eucharistic banquets at Corinth had become immoderate and sometimes even decadent events. Paul reminds the Corinthians that the bread and wine were not just food, they were the real presence of Christ. Anyone who consumed them became coinheritors of Christ's mission. Sharing the Eucharistic banquet signified a willingness to live and die for the salvation of God's people. Paul teaches the Corinthians to balance their authentic joy at Christ's presence with an awareness of the awesome responsibility that gifts confers. + In the Gospel reading, Jesus provides a similar adaptation to his first followers. He compares the flesh and blood he offers his followers to the manna that Israel ate in the desert. The ancient Israelites received bread as a gift from God, but the bread Jesus offers is a gift of his verv self. + Just as Israel found life in bread and instruction. so Christians find eternal life in the Eucharist and Christ's example. The life of the world is accomplished when Christians consume the Body and Blood of Christ and then go forth to teach generosity, courage, love and faith.

Questions to Ponder

How has God supported you materially? Spiritually? + How does your reception of the Eucharist help you live like Jesus? + Explain how St. Paul describes our participation in the life of Christ through the Eucharist.

The Practice of Charity

So much about being a Christian is about inexorable commitment, and nothing demonstrates that as starkly as the Eucharistic meal. As St. Paul explained, when we partake, we participate. We become one with each other in Christ, now committed to his mission and to each other in the most profound way. One must be accountable to what one is becoming, and so to what one is doing, when

receiving the Body and Blood of Christ. Too often we forget that this commitment inevitably involves some sacrifice—participation in the body means participation in the blood, as well. + Pray about what it means for someone to be deprived of the Eucharistic and then finally get to receive it after a long time. What joy!
