SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

It can be a challenge to recognize God at work in ours and other's lives. In our first reading, Ezekiel pleads with Israel to recognize that it was not God but they who caused the invasion and social collapse they faced. In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus reminds Israel's priests and elders that, although they know how to draw near to God, they failed to recognize the desire of sinners to do the same. + First-century Jews believed tax collectors and prostitutes benefited from Israel's national humiliation. Tax collectors enriched themselves by plundering Jews on Rome's behalf. Prostitutes earned much of their living from the Roman soldiers who occupied Israel. Both groups symbolized Israel's op-

pression, and faithful Jews resented them thoroughly. + Such attitudes kept the faithful from noticing that many tax collectors and prostitutes had a real desire for change. Many responded with eagerness to the mercy that John the Baptist and Jesus showed them. The Gospels contain many stories of the sudden and total conversion of tax collectors and prostitutes. Their desire for change was real, and as they transformed their lives, they gave evidence that God was at work among them. + Resentments robbed many people of the humility that would have allowed them to see and join God's work. Pride obscured the need for grace, and persecution led them to believe they earned God's love through suffering. Such entitlement kept Israel's chief priests and elders from recognizing their need fore divine mercy. They were thus unable to identify the effects of divine mercy among sinners and they failed to join God's effort. + Such problems remain today. God's kingdom includes all parts of a polarized world. Christ's disciples must be able to recognize God's work wherever they find it and be willing to join in the task. This is how we, as St. Paul exhorts, can have in us the same attitude that is in Christ.


> UUEEN OF ANGELS PARISH ANNUAL RIGATONI AND MEATBALL DINNER

A healthy weekly deposit should be closer to \$5,000 to meet our diocesan assessments, payroll, utilities and other expenses related to ministries and maintenance. Information such as this will determine the viability of a parish and decisions going forward.
