

Scripture Reflection

At the end of the baptismal liturgy, a candle is lit from the paschal candle and handed to the parents of the child with these words: "Parents and godparents, this light os entrusted to you to kept burning brightly, so that your child, enlightened by Christ, may walk always as a child of the light and, persevering in the faith, may run to meet the Lord when he comes with all the Saints in the heavenly court." Behind this prayer stands the parable we hear in the Gospel reading today, about the five wise and five foolish young women. + Unique to Matthew, this is the only parable of watching and waiting where discipleship is portrayed in feminine imagery. In the parable, the kingdom of heaven "will be like" a gathering of young women, unmarried but of age twelve,- who according to cultural norms are waiting at the bride's parental home so that they can meet the bridegroom as he approaches the house. Jesus has earlier referred to himself in Matthew's Gospel as the "bridegroom" and God as "husband" is a recurring Old Testament metaphor (see Isaiah 54:5; Jeremiah 31:332; and Hosea 2:16). The parable presents us with both a positive and negative model of how disciples are to wait for the return of Jesus the Bridegroom at the end of human history. The emphasis is on the oil and the burning lamps, not on the falling asleep, which all ten maidens do when the arrival of the bridegroom is delayed. In baptism, we are chosen to illumine the passage of Christ the Bridegroom through our world by the lives we live. For Matthew, "oil" and "lamps" are symbolic of good works and Christian witness that gives glory to God. + In Gospel terms, readiness to greet the Bridegroom and go with him to the eternal wedding banquet means a life lived in constant vigilance for and obedience to the reign of God that Jesus proclaims. The baptized neophyte, the newly married, the newly professed or ordained, the beginner in a longed-for-job,-all are excited and determined about the life to which they have committed themselves; all have their "lamps" burning brightly. Deeper into the night, into the demands of decades of oil refilling and wick tending, some flames may have flickered out while others continue to burn steadily and brightly. even though some may light up paths that differ from their original way the lamp carriers thought they would walk. + Although the parable is primarily concerned with what lies behind the, as yet, closed doors of the end of cosmic history and Christ's second coming, the Bridegroom will also come to us in our won death. One Eucharist will be last from which we take the oil from the two tables of word and sacrament that help us keep our lamps burning and light our way to open the doors of our hearts to the Bridegroom.


+ Questions to Ponder

How does this reading work for you as an image of Christ? How does it compare with the Gospel?
